
Year 2 Spring 1



	 Revise reading words ending in the suffixes '-ed' and '-ing.' 	
	•Continue to practise reading KS1 Common Exception Words and high frequency words (These are	
	listed in your child's Reading Record)	
	 Encourage to notice and correct 'marvellous mistakes' when reading. 	
	 Read aloud books matched to the children's individual phonetic ability, focusing on decoding, 	
	prosody, and comprehension	
	 Re-read these books to build up fluency and confidence in word reading. 	
	 Read and share a range of stories linked to mythical creatures. 	
	• Continue to build a love of reading during golden reading time where children have an opportunity	
	to read anything they like from comics, children's newspapers, stories, and non-fiction texts.	
	Begin to explore comprehension reading tasks, focusing on strategies of underlining key words in a	
	question and deciphering what the question is asking.	
	Practise retrieval of comprehension questions within a text.	
Writing	•Continue to practise using the following word classes; Noun, adjective, verb and adverb.	
	• Revisit what a compound sentence is and use the conjunctions; 'and', 'but', 'because' in sentences.	
	Additionally, begin to use other subordinating conjunctions; so, when, if, until	
	• Begin to understand what apostrophes are and when they are used:	
	Contracted forms (e.g. <i>I'm, don't, he'll, can't</i>)	
	Possessive apostrophes (e.g. <i>dragon's tail, troll's bag</i>).	
	• Spellings and suffixes: Adding the suffixes –ing –ed –er and –est.	
	• Describe a range of mythical creatures using adjectives, similes and interesting verbs and adverbs.	
	Begin to distinguish between homophones and near homophones.	
	• Continue to build stamina with independent writing throughout the term.	
	• Create writing for a range of purposes and audiences, including fact writing, descriptions, letters and	
	stories	
	• Continue to develop proofreading skills to check that writing makes sense and capital letters and punctuation are accurately used, practicing this both independently and with a partner.

	 Investigate which material is the most absorbent.
	 Explain how the shapes of objects made from some materials can be changed.
	 Make predictions and carry out simple tests, discovering the most suitable materials to make
	a casing for a dragon egg.
Art	Our Art learning for this half term will focus on creating a clay dragon eye. The children will learn to:
	 Sketch waves and dragon scales in the style of Hokusai.
	 Draw objects that overlap, taking inspiration from Matisse and a local craftsperson.
	Design their dragon eye using tone and shadow.
	• Use sculpture and clay to develop and share their ideas, experiences and imagination.
	Manipulate clay to create their dragon eye.
	 Seal their clay dragon eye.
Computing	Our Computing leaning for this half term will focus on 'Making Music.' The children will learn to:
	Describe how music makes them feel.

	Create music for a purpose and save their work
	Review and refine their computer work
Geography	Our Geography learning for this half term will focus on 'Mapping our local area and beyond.' The
•	children will learn to:
	Discuss characteristics of landmarks on the UK map.
	• Explore a variety of maps, explaining what they are used for using geographical vocabulary.
	Create an annotated field sketch and discuss changes that could improve the environment.
	 Use simple compass directions to describe where places are in relation to one another
	 Draw a route map with a key and compass points
	Make a mini landscape for a mythical creature using natural materials and to describe why the
	landscape is suitable using geographical vocabulary.
Music	Our Music learning this half term will focus on 'Myths and Legends' in line with the 'Kapow' scheme of
	learning. The children will learn to:
	Create rhythms and arrange them in a particular order or structure.
	Identify the structure of a piece of music and write it down.
	Describe whether a musical texture is thick or thin.
	Explore ways of writing down different textural layers.
	Follow a given structure for a composition.
	Write a structure score accurately.
	Compose music with several layers.
	Perform their composition accurately, following the structure score























Our focussed learning behaviour for this half term is:
