### How young?

### 3 month/

babies look more at faces that match the race of their caregivers

### 2.5 yea*rı*

children begin to use race as a factor in deciding who to play with

### 4-5 years old

expressions of racial prejudice peak - black children don't show any preference to their own racial group, but white children do

### 5-7 yea*rı*

children have already learned to associate some groups with higher status than others - they show many of the same racial attitudes that adults do

"... explicit conversations with 5-7 year olds about interracial friendships can dramatically improve their racial attitudes"

### Being anti-racist at home:

As adults - learning about all forms of racism:	<ul> <li>Books, instagram, podcasts (recommendations to follow!)</li> </ul>
As family - talking about race:	Having conversations!
Seeking positive representation:	<ul> <li>Diversity of books, toys, films, TV programs, skin colour pencils</li> <li>Positive role models</li> </ul>
Interacting with the resources:	<ul> <li>Talking about difference (and similarity!)</li> <li>Notice the narratives</li> </ul>
Raising allies:	Teach melanin, stereotypes, kindness, fairness
Talking to schools:	Keep the dialogue going

## develop an understanding and respect of diverse race within our school community





## treating people differently, and unfairly, because of their skin colour, where they come from or their family traditions.













**Carlisle** Infant School Children's first views of happy, heroic and successful individuals aren't all light skinned and...



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
