We have been exploring this fantastic story all week and enjoying the wonderful rhymes. Number: Last week we were comparing size, mass and capacity. We ordered things in different ways and used language like 'big', 'little', 'large' and 'small'. We thought about patterns we can see or hear. Can your child clap a pattern for you to follow? This week we have been thinking lots about the numbers 1,2 and 3. We have been finding these amounts in our environment and thinking how we can recognise the numbers without always counting (this is called subitising).
